

2019 IN REVIEW...



Aing is a trainee laboratory technician at the National Animal Health Laboratory in Vientiane, Laos. We met her while she and her colleagues were washing test tubes to be reused for future laboratory work. She told us: "I love my job because I help many people who work on farms. But the most challenging part is ensuring we protect ourselves from the risk of contamination from bacteria."



Last month Fleming Fund partners met for a conference in Laos. The Department of Health and Social Care, Mott MacDonald, grantees, partners and the national government all contributed to the event. During the conference, Mr John Pearson, Her Majesty's Ambassador to Laos, hosted a special event in Vientiane for Fleming Fund partners. H.E. Why does the Fleming Fund support animal health initiatives? Aren't people the most important?

The unchecked use of antibiotics in animals for growth promotion contributes to the bulk of the AMR problem. Estimates vary, but it is likely that, 70-90% of all antibiotics used globally are in animal husbandry. It is essential to understand the use of antibiotics in animals and regulate this more effectively to ensure antibiotics remain effective treatment for humans.
